Holy Week and Easter



We find ourselves moving into Holy Week and Easter, a very significant period in the Church calendar. However, due to the current circumstances caused by COVID-19, the normal observances and traditions associated with Holy Week and Easter are not taking place due to various restriction placed upon us all. For some the only Easter tradition they will be concerned about is if they can still get their Easter Eggs. Currently it seems that toilet paper is the only commodity in short supply, so hopefully Easter Eggs will be available when required.

There will be people who will face hardship, pain and grief as a result of this crisis, and we should help in whatever way we can to bring relief to their suffering where and when possible. We should be thankful and pray for all those who are supporting our society in various ways, the people who deliver the supplies to the hospitals and supermarkets, who work in the supply and retail industry, for those who work in the NHS and those who support a neighbour in need, may God bless them in their work and keep them safe.

Although I understand the reasons the lockdown restrictions are deemed necessary, I and many others will lament not being able to celebrate Palm Sunday, commemorate Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. To be able to shout with joy 'Alleluia, Jesus Christ is risen!' and hear the joyful response 'He is risen indeed, alleluia!' on Easter morning. I am saddened that we have come to a point that people are unable to peacefully gather to celebrate the most significant event in human history, the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, when all of humanity has been given the opportunity to be reconciled with God through the love and Grace of Christ.

Regardless if we can celebrate Easter in church in the traditional way or not, the historic fact that Jesus rose from the dead on that wondrous Easter morning will not change. As St Paul wrote in his first letter to the Corinthians 1:18; 'For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God'. This is what gives Christians faith and the assurance to face the future. As the chorus of an old hymn reminds us;

Because He lives, I can face tomorrow. Because He lives, All fear is gone. Because I know He holds the future, And life is worth the living just because He lives. In times of uncertainty, when we can be bombarded with tales of doom and calamity and the shortage of toilet paper, Christians are the people of hope. We are supposed to standout like a light in the darkness or a city on a hill. Let us as Christians show the love of Christ to our neighbours and reflect his glory to the world.

On Easter Sunday we can all proclaim with confidence 'Alleluia, Jesus is risen'. For we know 'He alone is my rock and my salvation, my fortress; I shall not be shaken' (Psalm 62:6).

Here are a few inspirational and comforting scripture references for those who are interested; Palms 23, 91, 103, 121. Isaiah 6:8, Jeremiah 29:11, Matthew 11:28-30, John 3:16, John 14:1-6, Romans 8: 38-39 & 10: 9-11. Hebrews 11:1,2. If you would like more, just open the bible on any page and you're likely to find something.

	4 th Reading John 19:28-37
	5 th Reading John 19:38-42
